

PROMOTES EMPATHY, EMPOWERMENT, & INCLUSIVITY Colors of Kindness, developed by Amal Alliance, is a multi-award winning educational program renowned for its innovative integration of technology to foster social and emotional learning (SEL) among children. Aimed at promoting empathy, empowerment, and inclusivity, it extends a helping hand to those most in need of support, including refugees, children with disabilities, and those from underserved communities. Initially crafted to address the urgent needs of children in emergency situations, who are often deprived of crucial life skills, the program's versatility has been proven through successful applications in diverse environments such as Bangladesh, Greece, and Uganda in both informal and formal educational settings.

Tailored to meet the unique cultural and situational needs of its participants, Colors of Kindness offers various iterations of the curriculum, ranging from 10 to 18 weeks, alongside a selfpaced SEL workbook. Its recognition by the LEGO Foundation & HundrED as one of the most innovative and scalable methodologies for social and emotional learning underscores its effectiveness and the potential for wide-reaching impact. Despite challenges posed by limited connectivity in some regions, the program delivers its rich content through an engaging mix of digital workbooks and weekly podcasts, featuring universally relatable, colorful, gender-neutral characters that guide children through their learning journey.

SEL is crucial for supporting mental health and creating positive learning environments. It equips learners with essential life skills for academic and real-world success, addressing gaps often overlooked in traditional curriculums.

WHY SEL?

MOVING TO SCALE

In Greece, the COVID-19 pandemic drastically affected children's lives, leading to school closures and increased household stress, with vulnerable groups suffering the most. This period, however, offered a chance to reimagine education to enhance wellbeing and academic outcomes. Notably, Greece shelters a significant number of refugee and migrant children, whose education was further jeopardized by the pandemic.

In response, Amal Alliance launched a collaborative pilot project with the Greek Ministry of Education and Religious Affairs and six NGOs, utilizing Learning Equality's Kolibri platform and conducting a study with the Harvard Graduate School of Education's EASEL Lab. Running from January to June 2022, this initiative reached 400 children across diverse settings, emphasizing the need for quality social-emotional learning (SEL) resources and psychosocial support. 


The pilot demonstrated the effectiveness of targeted SEL interventions, showing notable improvements in students' SEL competencies despite challenges like absenteeism. Inspired by these results, the Greek Ministry of Education endorsed the nationwide rollout of Colors of Kindness. With Amal Alliance, the program was expanded, making it available to all public schools via the Skills Lab platform from September 2022. This expansion underscores a commitment to enhancing SEL in education, and adapting to the needs of children across Greece.

With ongoing efforts to refine and evaluate the program's impact, Amal was selected for the MIT Solve/LEAP Challenge funded by Jacobs Foundation. Together we built a roadmap of key factors for the early stage of scaling.

EARLY ADOPTERS

In 2023, Colors of Kindness had transitioned from a pilot phase to early stage scale. Starting the academic year with 280 early adopters, the following semester expanded to 320 classrooms. With massive media exposure, introductory sessions across municipalities and awareness sessions with regional educational directors Amal Alliance set to broaden its impact through strategic scaling efforts. Focusing on engaging both parents and teachers directly, our next steps include organizing pop-up sessions and comprehensive campaigns aimed at empowering these crucial stakeholders. These interactive sessions are designed to equip parents and teachers with the knowledge and tools necessary for integrating social emotional learning (SEL) principles into daily interactions with children, both at home and in school environments. By fostering a community-wide understanding of SEL's importance, we aim to create a supportive ecosystem that enhances the efficacy of the Colors of Kindness program. This community-centered approach not only amplifies the reach and impact of our initiatives but also ensures that the benefits of SEL are sustained and woven into the fabric of educational practices across Greece, reinforcing our commitment to nurturing resilient and emotionally intelligent future generations.

ABOUT THE PROGRAM

COUNTRY CONTEXT: UGANDA

Uganda hosts the largest refugee population in Africa with over 1.45 million people primarily from South Sudan and the DRC. It has faced a severe educational crisis exacerbated by the pandemic. Over 13 million Ugandan children, including 600,000 refugee children, have been out of school since March 2020, with uncertain prospects for returning due to sporadic school reopenings and closures This crisis fueled our partnership with Hopelink for All Foundation (HAF-Uaanda) ß Learning Equality to bring the Flying Colors program to Uganda.



Flving Colors is an innovative initiative designed to engage children aged 7-12, including those out of school and from vulnerable refugee and host community backgrounds in Palabek Refugee Settlement, in digital learning through a mix of playful and social-emotional learning within a blended education model. This project aims to support 600 learners at levels equivalent to P3 and P4. utilizing Amal Alliance's Colors of Kindness program-specifically developed to help children navigate the complex emotions arising from emergencies and trauma-integrated into Kolibri. Kolibri, developed by Learning Equality, is an offline-first educational toolkit that allows for the organization and distribution of educational content and facilitator resources without the need for internet access, facilitating learner progress tracking and data collection on a large scale.

Central to Flying Colors is the "Flying Colors Bundle," a collection of newly developed learning resources focused on promoting learning through play and fostering enjoyable learning experiences. This unique approach facilitates a true blended learning experience, where the new educator support materials enable impactful engagement with the digital content on the platform and guide projectbased playful learning activities offline.

ENGAGING, DIGITAL CONTENT ACCESSED OFFLINE

PROMOTING INTEGRATION & CULTURAL UNDERSTANDING



Flying Colors aims to broaden educational access by providing interactive, consistent, and engaging teaching and learning materials in settings where internet access is unavailable. The program supports the continuation of education for at-risk and out-of-school learners through modules aligned with the national curriculum, thereby paving the way for their integration into formal education systems. The goal is to improve academic outcomes and promote the integration of displaced children into host communities, enhancing cultural understanding. Curriculum development and implementation are timed to coincide with school terms, aiming to establish links to formal education, although direct reintegration is not the program's primary focus.

The project's name, Flying Colors, is inspired by the Kolibri (meaning "hummingbird" in many languages), symbolizing global reach, combined with the SEL-focused "Colors" curriculum. In collaboration with the Hopelink for All Foundation (HAF) Uganda, the first and second cohort ran through 2023. With a commitment to community-involved co-design and backed by its evidence partner Innovations for Poverty Action, Flying Colors is poised for impactful expansion and scalability.

LEVERAGING TECH




EdTech significantly enhances education but cannot replace in-person learning. It should support and personalize the educational process, using digital tools to improve wellbeing and teaching strategies. To blend technology effectively while maintaining human interaction, we suggest four key strategies: understand the specific educational context to customize learning, boost teacher skills in social and emotional learning (SEL) for their and their students' wellbeing, incorporate SEL to address gaps in traditional education, and adopt a hybrid approach that combines technology with traditional methods to meet modern needs.

RESULTS


In 2022/23, we piloted Flying Colors in 4 schools in Palabek Refugee Settlement in Northern Uganda, with a focus on primary school age out-of-school learners. 714 refugee and host community learners were enrolled in one of two consecutive 12-week cohorts, enabling learning and an iterative approach to set up Flying Colors for future replication and scale. Results showed strong improvements in learners' English literacy, numeracy, and social-emotional skills. You can find the full results <u>here</u>.

Moderator for High-Level Panel: Achieving health and wellbeing for all: strengthening health systems and mental health & psychosocial support for refugees and host communities



In 2023, Amal Alliance avidly laid the foundation for 2024. Gearing up to expand our efforts to migrants and low-income families in the US, we prepared for the launch of two pilots. 1) Bringing Colors of Kindness to the Rafael Hernandez School in Boston, and 2) beginning to design and structure the mobile learning program estimated to be wheels rolling May 2024.

BRINGING PROGRAMS TO THE USA

To address challenges of stress, anxiety, depression, and other mental health concerns among migrant and underserved children in the U.S., we began planning for a pilot of Colors of Kindness in a magnet school within the Boston Public School System. Colors of Kindness will run in the Rafael Hernandez Dual Language public school of Boston for 16 weeks from January - June 2024.



Additionally, we began to form partnerships to bring a mobile learning/care bus of Colors of Kindness to migrant children in the State of Massachusetts. Together with the Massachusetts Governor's Executive Office of Education, Horizons for Homeless Children, and Neighborhood Villages, we will provide developmentally appropriate and trauma-informed care to migrant children living in remote motel shelters. We expect to be wheels rolling June 2024, and hope to establish a model for replication across the Commonwealth and neighboring states.

MOBILE LEARNING



Amal Alliance is a proud Member of the Global Refugees Forum (GRF) Education Alliance. Launched in Geneva in December 2019, the inaugural forum helped transform the aspirations of the Global Compact on Refugees into concrete action. At the High Level Officials Meeting in December 2021, we announced that we fulfilled the 4 pledges made at the inaugural GRF, and exceeded our initial goal fivefold.

In the lead up to the GRF 2023, Amal Alliance renewed their engagement and pledged their commitment to children worldwide with two pledges for 2023-2027. Click below to learn more about each pledge.
